2. DECIDE what type of conversation is being instigated. Is it 'a Battle for Control', 'a Test' or 'a Challenge'?

3. CHECK the script – have you defined the conversation or have you identified the dialogue?

4. DECIDE what theIs the responder 'doing the same thing back'RESPONDER is doing?or 'resisting', 'avoiding' or 'denying'?

5. CHECK whether this conversation has a turning point.

6. DECIDE on the ending or outcome of the conversation.

If so label what 'realization' changes the direction of the conversation. If there's no turning point, decide item 6. (*Turning points are not common in screenplays*)

A good starting point is to consider whether the outcome is a 'win', 'lose' or 'draw'.

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
